START A DIALOGUE ABOUT INTERNET USE IN YOUR HOME

Set aside time to sit down as a family to discuss how each person in the house uses the Internet. Invite everyone to share their understanding of safe and proper use of the computer.

Ask your child to show you what they've learned about using a computer. Let them take the lead demonstrating to you if they can surf the web, email, find a specific web address, use a search engine, etc.

Ask your child about their favorite websites and why they like visiting those sites.

Ask your child if they visit any interactive websites - sites where they can "chat" or email other kids. (Webkinz, American Girl Online World, etc.)

Talk about values and morals essential to the family and how those translate to using the Internet.

Use the age appropriate contracts and rules that will guide the safe use of the Internet in your home. The provided contracts/rules are suggestions only, meant to jump-start your family's dialogue. Change the wording as needed to suit your family's unique circumstances and needs.

ANSWER: B. I can report anything that is threatening or involves child pornography to the CyberTipline by visiting their web site at www.cybertipline.com or by calling 1-800-843-5678. They will ask questions about what happened and give my parents and me information about people who can help me.

ANSWER: C. Cyberbulling is intense online harassment – the bullies post mean, insulting or embarrassing comments or pictures about or of another person with the intent to deeply hurt that person. Like harassment, cyberbullying is illegal. Practice good citizenship online – if you wouldn't say it to someone's face, don't say it online.

8. When posting pictures of myself online, I should

ANSWER: C. Choose the pictures you post or send by cell phone with care – check with your parents before you post a picture online and think before you post. Don't post pictures of yourself in a school uniform that could lead a predator to your area. Be careful to post or send pictures that aren't revealing or embarrassing. Once you send a picture or post an image, you lose control of its final destination and ultimate audience. Remember, "send" is 4ever.

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Give yourself O points if you've never done it, 1 point if you have done it 1 or 2 times, 2 points if you have done it 3-5 times, 3 points if you have done it more than 5 times.

- Hacked into someone else's computer or sent a virus or Trojan horse to them?
 - Insulted someone in an interactive game room?
- Posted rude things or lies about someone online?
- Voted at an online bashing poll or posted to a guestbook saying rude or mean things?
