Ways to Prepare for the End of the School Year

1. Manage Spring Fever

As school winds down, the end-of-the-year events — from music recitals to sports banquets — clog the calendar. But the academic year isn't over yet! Making sure your kids finish with their best effort — when their efforts are required in so many different areas — can be quite a challenge.

- Stick with the routine. Try your best to stick with your child's regular after-school routine. Set homework rules and check to make sure they are still meeting deadlines. If a progress report says your child's work isn't getting done, make a plan with your child to ensure a strong finish.
- Address stress. If your child is showing symptoms of end-of-year-stress not eating or sleeping well or being irritable you may want to talk to them about ways to handle the pressure of juggling too many balls.

2. Plan your child care

Need child care every day or just occasionally this summer? Begin to look for summer camps that meet the needs that you are looking for (i.e. enrichment camps, overnight camps, etc.).

3. Ask the teacher for a reading list for the summer.

Teachers often have lists for the appropriate grade level, or in some cases, you might be able to get specific recommendations for two kinds of books, those your child may enjoy reading, and those you may enjoy reading to your child.

4. Research summer jobs for your teenager

Summer jobs can prevent boredom and help teens make their own money. Your child may not be old enough to have a "real" job this summer, but you can still teach them the value of a dollar. Try paying them by completing chores or help them search the neighborhood for odd jobs (i.e. mowing the lawn, cleaning up someone's yard, etc). Your child can even volunteer at a local organization.

5. Review final report card

Your child will be bringing home his/her final report card soon. Take the time to look closely at each grade and compare their marks to those earned previously. Don't forget to read the teacher's comments for additional clues about your child's progress. If you're having trouble understanding any of the information, contact the school immediately. Remember that teachers only remain in the school building for a few days after school ends. P.S. teachers last day is June 13, so be sure to contact them before this date.

· Ways to respond

When a child brings home a great report card, they deserve to be praised. If your child brings home a less-than-perfect report, it won't help to get visibly upset. Instead, talk to your child about the progress they've made this year. Whether it's As, Ds, or grades in between — find the best way to react to your child's individual situation.

• Make time over the summer for learning

There are several ways kids can improve their skills during the summer so they can return to school with added confidence. You may still be able to enroll your child in a summer-school program. Investigate any remedial programs that exist at local colleges. Tutors are another option — you can obtain names of tutors from your school or classroom teachers. You can also call high schools and inquire about volunteer tutor programs. Two other options are to tutor your child yourself or enroll him in a learning center.

6. Analyze Test Scores

Schools use spring standardized test scores as one of the criteria for class placement, inclusion in gifted programs, and placement in mandatory basic-skills programs. So it's important that you understand the percentiles, local and national, and composite scores that you'll find on that sheet of paper. If you're confused, you're not alone! Just place a call to the counselor, teacher, or an administrator in your school and ask for help interpreting the scores.

7. Plan ahead for next years school classes

It's smart to start thinking about the next school year during the spring. Consider how your child has performed this school year and what might help them do even better next year.

• Gifted programs, Honors and AP courses

Do you think your child has special talents? Don't miss out! Nows the time to submit parent and teacher referrals for gifted-and-talented programs, AP courses, and honors courses. An evaluation period may be underway in your school to determine eligibility for programs in the fall.

Separating kids

This is also the time to share with your child's current teacher any concerns you may have about separating your child from another student. For example, you might request to have your child placed in a different class from a friend they are too dependent on. Don't hesitate to convey any concerns that you think will contribute to your child's success.

8. Consider Retention vs. Advancement

You should know by now if your child's teachers are considering retention. Retention planning usually requires teachers to submit requests earlier in the year. Parents should be informed along each step in this process.

To stay or not to stay?

There's great controversy in the education and mental-health communities over retention, and research doesn't tend to support the practice. If your child is experiencing great academic difficulty, it may be due to an undiagnosed learning disability. Before deciding whether or not to retain your child, request a professional evaluation to rule out a learning disability.


Letter From Mr. Scira, Art Teacher






In Mrs. Howden's Reading class, students have been working hard and having fun. In January, we read The Bully which is about a boy who moves from Philadelphia to Los Angeles and gets bullied because he is so small for his age. He joins the wrestling team and builds his confidence and strength. He stands up to the bully and helps others as well. February is Black History Month so we learned a lot about President Barack Obama. The students learned about his childhood, college years, how he got started in politics, and his many accomplishments. Focusing on non-fiction, we are currently doing a unit on Amazing Underwater Animals. We have read about Ferocious Fish (orcas, piranhas, barracudas, moray eels, giant squid, etc.) and discovered what they eat, where they live, what they look like and more. We have created a map of where they can be found around the world and read about a boy who catches fish to feed his family. We are learning about sharks and how to avoid a shark attack. We continue to focus on reading skills such

SPECIAL NEWS: Health Examination Requirement

Dear Parents of Eighth Grade Students,

Starting with the 2013-2014 school year, Delaware schools will require that all students entering 9th grade must have a current health examination on file. The health examination must have been completed within 2 years of entry into 9th grade and must be received within 30 days from the start of school. The following forms will be accepted:

- a) Delaware School Health Examination Form or
- b) DIAA Pre-Participation Physical Evaluation form or
- c) Health Examination or evaluation document on a form which includes, at a minimum: healthy history, immunizations, results of medical testing and screenings, medical diagnose, prescribed medications and treatments, and healthcare plans.)

(the most recent versions of both a and b can be found on the P.S. website)

This notification is provided <u>now</u> so that you will have ample time to obtain a health exam prior to September, 2013. As with other regulatory requirements, students who do not meet the requirement will be excluded from school until this requirement is met. The regulation can be accessed at: http://regulations.delaware.gov/AdminCode/title14/800/815.shtml#TopOfPage.

In the event that your child had a health examination within the past two years, there is no requirement for an additional examination; however, the school will need documentation of the examination. If a recent physical examination has not been completed, please arrange for an appointment with your health care provider.
